As CWL members we have the advantage of monthly meetings and minutes for those who cannot attend, to educate each other on relevant issues. Through our seven Standing Committees, we are made aware of current concerns, offered concrete steps to take action and obtain feedback on results. By being Catholic and Living it, we engage as much as we are able in assisting the committee chairs. Our Past President is always on hand to be a source of support for the executive and all members.

The Organization Chairperson invites us to work on membership drive weekends and promotion of the League.

Christian Family Life brings us updates on ministry to youth, the disabled, seniors, singles, widowed, married, separated, young adults, divorced and those with vocations.

Community Life includes a broader scope of duties involving dignity and rights of persons, social and economic justice, refugees, immigration and citizenship, the Canadian Organization for Development and Peace, and Canadian Missions. Our Education and Health committee seems pretty straightforward but it is fairly extensive. Catholic education at all levels, literacy and continuing education, wellness and health plus environment are the key areas.

Our Communications Chairperson is responsible for evangelization and promotion of the League. She offers excellent content via newsletters, bulletins, and media relations, endorsing parish events and making

us aware of workshops being offered by other levels of the CWL.

The Resolutions and Legislation Committee includes research and implementation of resolutions at all levels of government in cooperation with Diocesan, Provincial and National CWL Councils. The legislation aspect includes monitoring and studying issues at all levels of government. The local concern may be homelessness and what the city is doing to address this.

All of these Standing Committees welcome members to participate in even one concern. You do not necessarily have to attend meetings, although we encourage you to, but you can lend your voice and ideas by emailing to our new address at cwlstmichlon@gmail.com. We invite speakers to our meetings to inform us of specific concerns and sometimes just for fun. Please let us know your suggestions for speakers.

There are many ways to participate – prayer everyone can incorporate, letter writing to all levels of government with no postage required, phone calls and visits to shut-ins and those in long-term care, carpooling for mass or meetings, and I am sure I am missing some ideas. Are you lukewarm? (Revelation 3:16)

Friends, once Jesus conducted a campaign on one of the streets of the village. Devil also did the same on the other street of the same village. There was a huge wall that separated the area of Jesus' campaign and the devil's campaign. Those who chose Jesus lined up with Jesus, and those who chose Devil lined up with the devil.



But there was a man in that village who found it difficult to choose between Jesus and Devil. Jesus or Devil? He was having a bit of confusion between them. So, with all his confusion, he decided to be neutral. That means he chose neither Jesus nor the devil. So, he sat on the wall which separated the area of Jesus' preaching and the Devil's preaching.

After the campaign, everyone went along with the person whom they had chosen. Those who had chosen Jesus went to heaven with Jesus; and those who had chosen the devil, went to hell with the devil.

Now, once everything was settled down, the devil came back to this man who was neutral in his decision; and the devil pulled him and was dragging him to hell. So, the man shouted, "Why are you dragging me to hell, for I did not choose you?"

The devil replied, "No one can be neutral while choosing between God and me. They can choose either God or me. If you are neutral, then you are already mine!"

Applications must be completed on the official application form.

LONDON DIOCESAN J.L. HENNESSEY EDUCATION BURSARY <http://www.cwllondon.ca/Forms.html> This bursary is available to any League member or her immediate family. It shall be used to finance education at any level: university, community colleges, technical school, etc. Applications to the London Diocesan J.L. Hennessey Education Bursary (with supporting documentation – refer to the criteria) must be submitted to London Diocesan Catholic Women's League President ie. emailed or postmarked by April 1st. Applications must be completed on the official application form.

Featured Member Anna Kovacic

Anna has been a faithful Catholic all her life and an involved CWL member for 39 years at St. Michael's, attending meetings and special events regularly. What she appreciates about CWL is the fact that it upholds Gospel values and is instrumental in protecting and reaching out to all people rich or poor, Christian or non-Christian, with service and social justice to all. The CWL promotes participation at whatever level you can offer and has the highest regard for life at all stages. Anna cherishes the many pilgrimages, the miracles she has witnessed and seemingly impossible activities resulting from times of fellowship and prayer with other members. She mentions that often she hesitates to take part but then follows her motto – *Trust and go wherever God opens an opportunity.*

Anna expressed much gratitude for the friendships she has developed through the CWL and daily Mass. Her devotion to daily Mass and Rosary is truly an example of dedicated faith, hope and love. Every encounter someone has with Anna leaves them truly believing they have met a living saint, a woman who has a degree of holiness and a particular closeness to God. Her extraordinary devotion to the Apostolate of the Sacred Heart of Jesus is her favourite topic of conversation. The mission of the Apostolate is a renewal and restoration of Christian family values based in the love of God.

Anna was born in Slovakia and along with her parents and sister Maria, escaped the communist overtaking in a dramatic flight by horse and carriage with opposing snipers shooting randomly. Later, when Anna married Albin he was jailed and held at gunpoint for expressing anti-communist views. Once again Anna had to flee with Albin and two children. A miraculous escape brought them first to Austria. World peace is an immense longing for Anna as she recounts the terrors and memories of growing up during WW II and reading the book her father wrote as a veteran about the tragedy of war. This has made her keenly sensitive and compassionate to victims of any conflict anywhere in the world. Her prayer for progress in ecumenism follows Jesus' prayer *That they may all be one; John 17:21.* In London, Anna worked at St. Mary's Hospital, and becoming more comfortable with English, volunteered with the CWL and ecumenical and heritage groups.

The lives of the saints are an enormous consolation and inspiration to Anna as she is interested in current politics from municipal to world governments. Many

saints had to face the ruling authorities of their time. Local, Canadian and world current events are part of her day so that she knows what to pray for. She also studies history, especially from her homeland of Slovakia. Prayer and faith were the lens through which life moves and had its meaning.

Anna's faith and devotion are an inspiration to us all, and we are blessed to count her among our members.

World Day of Prayer 2023

The World Day of Prayer started in the United States in the late 1800's and spread to Canada in the 1920's when Christian women in North America began to be involved in missions at home and in other parts of the world. Today it is observed in over 170 countries worldwide. Each year

on the first Friday in March, women gather in churches around the globe to celebrate a common scripture service based on a special theme for each year. Every year the service is written by women from a different country.

The 2023 service was written by the women of Taiwan and the theme is "I Have Heard About Your Faith," based on the letter to the Ephesians (1:15-19). It is an invitation to active listening, which is the basis of our prayers. The worship service brings us the witness of the saints with the stories from Taiwan.

World Day of Prayer will be observed on March 4, but the video can be viewed at any time.

Next year's live event in London will be organized by our own St. Michael's CWL and take place in our parish hall, with participation from other North London interdenominational churches.
