

Message from our President Dorothy Solomon



The National Catholic Women's League theme is "Catholic and Living It." Seems quite straightforward and causes me to stand proud of my faith. Standing proud is not enough, I must live it. This leads me to examine - what do I understand, believe,

and really know about being Catholic? Once I identify that I can live it more fully and consequently blessedly. Needless to say, one small article cannot begin to define this, but my first thought was regarding the sacraments. The Lent resource booklet, Living Faith, offers a brief quote by Monseigneur Stephen J. Rossetti:

There is a tendency to expect the divine intervention to be revealed in extraordinary ways. Elaborate rituals and ornate objects can evoke in our minds the mysterious presence of a distant, all-powerful god. So when Jesus, a poor carpenter began to preach, those from his own village rejected him. With the divine incarnation God now comes to us in the ordinary stuff of our daily lives. In the mass, Jesus comes to us in bread and wine. In baptism we receive the gift of life through flowing water. In confession the priest says a simple prayer to absolve our sins. As you go about your day look for God to be revealed in the ordinary. A friendly smile can remind us that we are loved. A brilliant sunset speaks of the glories of our Creator. A tasty meal reminds us that God provides. God is no longer distant. In Jesus, God is revealed in our ordinary lives.

Each of us identifies and grows in our awareness of what it means to be Catholic and what it means to live it. As women in the CWL, we are also guided by our principal call to faith, social justice and service. There is no shortage of opportunities to live out these aspects of our Catholic faith. Being Catholic means sensing God's presence and power sacramentally. We gradually come to know and understand that there is more to life than just what meets the eye or enters the ear. Catholics see sacraments as "close-ups" or clearly focused instances of God's presence and love. As Catholics we find ourselves challenged by the majority opinion of society. It takes time, prayer, patience and perseverance to grow into our identity as sacramental Catholics. We follow Jesus in his Way,

Truth and Life; his commands and example. As sisters in the League, we enter into solidarity with others who love deeply, live faithfully, and keep before them the call to grow ever closer to God through faith development, acts of social justice and service to neighbour.

The prayer developed for the theme, "Catholic and Living It" is printed on beautiful cards and can be found in the church library on the shelf labeled CWL, help yourself. Richest Easter Blessings. Dorothy

Palliative Care Week Marilyn Morgan

National Palliative Care Week is May 1-7, 2022. As a CWL initiative, members are being asked to participate in 12 Hours of Prayer for Palliative Care. It is more important than ever to pray that all Canadians have access to palliative care and for an increase in funding to support compassionate care of patients facing end-of-life situations. At St. Michael's we have chosen **Friday, May 6th** as our day to pray for this intention. Mass will be celebrated at 8am and we will have Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament from 8:30 until 3pm when there will be Benediction.

During the day we will set aside times to pray the Rosary, the Chaplet of Divine Mercy, the Magnificat and the Litany of Mary. We hope to have someone in the church throughout the day so there will be a signup sheet (in half hour increments), available on the welcome desk if you wish to set aside a specific time. Of course, for those who are unable to be at church, we hope you will join us in prayer at home on May 6th. We are also being encouraged to contact our Prime Minister, federal and provincial Ministers of Health and local Members of Parliament or Legislative Assembly to advocate for more accessible Palliative Care.
