## Giving Everyone a Sense of Belonging in our Faith Community

One of the distinctive features of the early Christian community is that

every member of the community was given a sense of belonging and they shared everything in common. "Now the multitude of those who believed were of one heart and one soul; neither did anyone say that any of the things he possessed was his own, but they had all things in common" (Acts 4:32).

Psychologists and sociologists have identified that there is hunger in every human person 'to belong' and Identity satisfies this hunger. This is referred to as the process of self-categorization which creates in one, a sense of belonging and identity. Continued on page 2

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Our Christian community provides us with an identity and a sense of belonging which is the product of our common faith. As a faith community, we come to Church to pray and to worship God. As a human community, the Church provides us with connections, support, and encouragement in times of joy, sorrow, or challenge. Again, we have the responsibility to journey with our brothers and sisters who are in need. Let our faith community strive to remain faithful to the mission of Jesus Christ, who came to show the world love and justice, protect the rights of the poor, bring freedom to those in captivity and give everyone a sense of belonging (Luke 4:18-19).

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## **Featured Member Joan Roffey**

This month, it's a pleasure to feature Joan Roffey as a CWL member who truly exemplifies our core values of faith, service and social justice. Those of us who attend 10:00 mass will recognize Joan from her roles as a reader and a choir member, sharing her faith in both word and song.

Joan grew up in Sarnia until she left for university here in London. After earning her teaching certificate in 1985, Joan taught in Sarnia, Markham and Whitby. She moved to London in 2001 with her husband, Mike, and their two children, Matthew and Kit, and started her long career as an elementary teacher with the London District Catholic School Board.

Joan joined our parish when she moved to London and has been a CWL member since 2010. Her mother was an active member for over 65 years and a role model of service, and Joan responded to Joan Lobsinger's invitation to follow in those footsteps. She has served on the executive as Chair of the Organization (Membership), Communications, and Spiritual Committees. She has also been a great help with this newsletter since its beginning, cheerfully providing helpful advice and contributing articles.

When it comes to service and social justice, Joan can always be counted on to pitch in. For example, in 2022, she took a leadership role in our successful drive to provide water purification straws for Ukraine, with approximately 60 straws collected and donated to the London Ukraine Centre. Over the years, she has volunteered with the Food Bank gardening group and Cancer Society Daffodil Days and is a current member of the Project Hope sandwich brigade. Music has always been a central focus for Joan, and she took part in theatre and choirs starting in grade school and continuing to the present day. After retiring in 2017, Joan found new ways to share her teaching abilities, organizational skills and love of music. She learned how to play a new instrument, the ukulele, and along with CWL member Marinette Laureano, started a new group called The SMUGlees (St. Michael's Ukulele and Glee.) Joan generously organized the group of new strummers, taught them how to play the ukulele, and made sure everyone felt welcome and included. Under Joan's direction, the group now plays at CWL Christmas parties and other CWL events. She also plays several different percussion instruments in the 10:00 a.m. choir, including the djembe (hand drum), claves (sticks) and tambourine to name a few.

Joan also has a long-standing love of nature and the great outdoors. She's an avid hiker, camper, birdwatcher and amateur stargazer. She and her husband Mike first bonded over their shared interest in astronomy.

Joan says she loves the CWL values described in the membership pamphlets – the power of the group to work for social justice, the faith, friendship and support for leadership development, and the dedication to the service of God and Canada. She especially values the opportunities to share her gifts in different ways, and we value her contributions to our council. We are blessed to count Joan among our members.

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## Look Strong! Act Strong! Be Strong! Be aware! Block out distractions! Marilyn Morgan

This was the important message given by Tammy Bernardo to almost 40 CWL members and guests at our October 2nd general meeting. Tammy is the coowner of Bernardo Karate & Cardio Kickboxing Studios. She is a Sixth-degree black belt and 17-time World Champion and 22-time Canadian Champion in Point fighting and Light Contact in three different karate organizations. Tammy has been a parishioner at St. Michael's for 23 years as well as a member of our CWL. Currently she serves on the Parish Pastoral Council and on the Parish Social Committee.

Tammy and fellow Black Belt, Gordana Elaschuk (also a parishioner and CWL member) offered us valuable self-defense information. They explained the importance of situational awareness and gave us simple strategies to help avoid situations where a physical assault may occur. We were given an informative handout which included personal safety tips for home, in elevators, and while walking and driving. This was included in the October CWL email on October 12th and is well worth consulting. Tammy and Gordana also demonstrated using elbows or knees in self defense, with Gordana striking and Tammy blocking. It's always better to avoid a dangerous situation in the first place, but if you have no other choice, your best defense is to "stun and run."



Members enjoyed the presentation and participated with many questions and shared stories about their own experiences. It's safe to say that we were all more aware of our surroundings in the parking lot after the meeting, and many of us "buddied up" for the walk back to our cars.

## Summer Retreat 2023

Following on the success of last year's mini retreat/workshop, CWL members gathered in the parish hall on Saturday August 26 for this year's event. President Dorothy organized the morning with help from team members Stephanie McIntyre who led us in opening prayers, Megan Young who led us in song, and Joan Lobsinger with her own team who made sure coffee and treats were readily available. As the morning progressed, it was clear that teamwork would be a major theme.

The main purpose of the retreat was to identify our issues and determine a direction for the next few months, and for the new executive that will be taking over in 2024. We examined our priorities under the headings of Faith, Service and Social Justice and a number of ideas emerged from the discussions.

For example, the group felt strongly that we should be more welcoming to new and potential members and have more parish-wide social events to attract more interest. We should also work to expand the diversity of our membership.

In terms of Service and Social Justice, we should revitalize our Community Life committee, and reinstate our financial support for Hospitality North. We could also follow up on the Bee Compassionate initiative to choose one topic, research it and report.

Possible speaker and topic suggestions for future meetings included end of life issues like MAID and palliative care, sex trafficking, and the results of the 2023 Synod by Diocese of London delegate to the Synod of Bishops in Rome this October, Linda Stoudt.

In terms of teamwork, Dorothy had us engage in some fun activities to show that one person can't do it all alone. It was quickly apparent that it's a lot easier to keep three balloons up in the air with two or three people helping, and almost impossible with just one. With Dorothy's oven mitt challenge, it quickly took more than one person to hold on to a mittful of kitchen utensils and other women needed to step in to help. The message was, there are too many CWL issues for just one person - it takes a team.

Also included in the morning were periods of reflection and sharing around the tables. We concluded by writing and sharing prayers that expressed our gratitude and set the tone for the months to come. In the words of Megan. "What a wonderful morning filled with prayer, sisterhood, and team building at the CWL mini retreat. Thank you to everyone who was able to come out and join us!"

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
