The strength of the League is that though it is a national organization, each parish council is unique and is especially able to address the needs of its own members and community. This is exemplified in the many ways you each live out the core values of faith, service and social justice. The individual members' involvements are just too numerous to list because many participate in the wider community that we may not hear about in our CWL minutes. Our wrap up potluck and awards ceremony (see page 11) gave us an opportunity to celebrate, socialize, thank and share our upcoming plans.

Not Departing, But Sent



In Ecclesiastes 3:1, the preacher says, "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens..." As my time as your Spiritual Advisor comes to an

end by the end of June, I must say that it has been an honour to have journeyed with you over the past two years.

Journeying closely with you has exposed me to the core mission of the Catholic Women's League (CWL), as reflected in its three pillars—faith, service, and social justice. I have had the privilege to be at CWL's various social events: the social outing, Potluck, Spring Friendship Luncheon, and Dinner Dance. These social events not only bring joy to participants but also foster a strong sense of community and belonging. I have also attended spiritual programs organized by CWL, such as the World Day of Prayer for Peace, Lenten Workshop, Reaffirmation Ceremony, a 12-hour adoration dedicated to those in Palliative care, and the Service of Pins. These programs bring spiritual upliftment to those who attend them.

Writing a reflection for the newsletter has been a fulfilling experience. The focus of my reflections has been to remind ourselves of the place of God's Word in our lives. I would like to sincerely thank you for your love, care, support and understanding over the past two years. I remain eternally grateful. I want you to know that you are always in my thoughts and prayers. Please also pray for me.

This is my parting prayer for you: "Now may the God of peace who brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, the great Shepherd of the sheep, by the blood of the eternal covenant, equip you with everything good that you may do his will, working in us that which is pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory forever and ever. I am excited to introduce to you Hiruni Fonseka! It was a pleasure getting to know Hiruni a little better while writing this article. She exudes cheerfulness and grace, and her energy is a great addition to our council.

Hiruni grew up in Sri Lanka with her parents and older sister. She was raised Catholic and participated in her church choir, Bible studies, Sunday School and other faith-based activities. Her faith continues to be important to Hiruni.

As a young adult, Hiruni followed her adventurous spirit by moving to India to study for her Bachelor of Speech Language Pathology and Audiology. Even though she didn't know anyone, she then moved to Malaysia where she worked as a speech language therapist for over three years.

At age 27, Hiruni fell in love and married. She and her husband had a few very happy years living in Toronto, but life took a turn. Hiruni became the caregiver for her husband who had contracted COVID. Combined with some underlying health issues, he passed away in 2021.

Hiruni took a break from work and with the help of others who guided her through this difficult time, she started praying again and refocused on her career. Hiruni took some post-grad certifications and moved herself once again, this time to London Ontario. She works at a hearing clinic here and in the fall will begin working on her Masters of Clinical Audiology at Western.

Hiruni joined St. Michael's Parish in 2022 and attends Mass regularly. She prays daily and describes her prayer life as a "conversation with God." She sees her life as a "living blessing of God."

Later in 2023, Hiruni decided to join the CWL. She wanted something more than her job and an empty house. She felt comfortable right away with this group of women and is happy to be involved in helping the community. Hiruni is our new Membership Chair and is looking forward to using her skills and getting to know more people in our group. From what I have learned about Hiruni, she will be excellent in this role!

In addition to her involvement with the CWL, Hiruni volunteers at the London Public Library as a tech tutor. A couple of times each year, she sends a donation to Sri Lanka to help provide food and school supplies to support a family in need there. Children and their education are very important to Hiruni. "This is how we beat poverty." She is also interested in helping mothers and expectant mothers. One day she hopes that she will have a family of her own.

Hiruni is truly an inspiration. She has exhibited a strong resilience to the challenges that life has given her. She is quick to smile, and her bubbly personality puts people at ease. She puts her trust in God. "God's plan for my life has been amazing. Everything I have prayed for God has given me, so I don't complain about the hardships." This summer, Hiruni will be returning to Sri Lanka to visit her family before beginning her studies in the fall. Pope Francis passed away on April 26, 2025, at the age of 88, leaving behind a profound spiritual legacy characterized by humility, compassion, and a commitment to social justice. Approximately 250,000 mourners gathered in St. Peter's Square for the funeral Mass, including 50 heads of state and 10 reigning monarchs. An additional 150,000 people lined the streets of Rome to witness the procession as his coffin was transported to Santa Maria Maggiore Basilica for burial, reflecting his global influence and the deep affection many held for him.

The papacy of our newly elected Pope Leo XIV began with a focus on unity, mercy, and social justice. In his inaugural Mass on May 18, 2025, attended by our Catholic Prime Minister and many other dignitaries from around the world, Pope Leo emphasized the importance of love and unity in the Church, condemning the exploitation of Earth's resources and the marginalization of the poor. His papal motto, "In the one Christ, we are one," reflects his commitment to fostering communion within the Church and the world.

We are so blessed to be a part of a universal church whose traditions and precepts are over 2,000 years old and whose members number over 1.4 billion people. As members of the CWL we are proud to support the legacy of Pope Francis and the papacy of Pope Leo as we live out the mission of our Catholic Women's League-Growing in faith and witnessing to the love of God through ministry and service and our core values of faith, service and social justice.

May Pope Francis rest in the peace he so often spoke of and sought to extend to others. And

may God bless Pope Leo XIV with wisdom, strength, and compassion as he shepherds us in faith, hope and charity.

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London Diocesan Convention 2025 Here I am Lord, Send Me

The 105th Annual Diocesan Meeting of Members, or CWL Convention, was held in Stratford on April 28th to April 30th, and was attended by several of our members. Here is what two of them had to say about the experience.



The best part of the convention is always the camaraderie and warm friendship among all the women. You simply feel at home.

The structure of the convention is planned to be modified for next year. It will take place over two days: one day for education, and the other for business. During the educational part of the convention, we all have a voice! If we have a special need or interest, they are always open to listening and addressing those needs. On the second day of this year's convention, for the first talk, Linda Staudt shared her experience participating in the Synod in Rome and explained how the Church is working to foster conversation and greater participation of all Catholics in the life of the Church and in spreading the Gospel. She made it sound like a very efficient process of discernment to empower evangelization. However, we still need to

see how this will work in our local churches.

For the second talk, Kathy Furlong spoke about the continued efforts to promote truth and reconciliation. I was shocked to learn that the apology offered by Pope Francis was never accepted. This means we must continue making efforts to pursue forgiveness and reconciliation. In real life, I find this process difficult to understand—if the other party does not wish to reconcile, no matter how great the effort made by those seeking reconciliation, it may not be enough.

During the Mass, Bishop Fabbro expressed his appreciation for all the support the CWL offers for the Church's projects. He acknowledged that the feminine genius is indispensable in the life of the Church and expressed his deepest gratitude for all the CWL does to support the Church and various charities.

At the Closing Banquet we enjoyed delicious food, great short speeches, and fun conversations at the tables with many new acquaintances.

The Family Foundations Institute (FFi) is dedicated to strengthening families in faith and relationships. Each year, they host a Women's Seminar. This year's theme was "Magnificently Created," with guest speaker Ann Burns, founder of

the Feminine Project and contributor to Crisis Magazine and Catholic Women in Business.

The seminar centered on femininity as a precious gift from God—meant to be cherished, embraced, and lived out with purpose. Burns emphasized that God calls women to serve the Church, encourage one another, and act as mentors. Femininity is at the heart of society, with the power to sustain life and bring healing.

Ann reflected on how, after giving birth to her daughter, people complimented her on the child's sweetness but warned of the "difficult teen years." This, she said, highlights a cultural problem: we don't know how to raise girls into confident, faithful women. Society often treats femininity as weakness, yet in Genesis, God created both masculinity and femininity and called them good. When we embrace our God-given limits, we discover our strengths. Masculinity and femininity are not in competition; they are complementary gifts.

Burns critiqued the waves of feminism: the first disrupted family structure, the second created division between men and women. The solution, she said, is turning back to God. Mary, the Blessed Mother, is the perfect example of feminine receptivity—saying "Yes" to God's will and modeling trust, courage, and service.

St. John Paul II outlined four key attributes of femininity:

- Receptivity: Welcoming God's will and embracing our role
- Generosity: Receiving fully and giving back abundantly
- Sensitivity: Recognizing and responding to others' needs
- Maternity: Whether physical or spiritual, nurturing and protecting life

These qualities reflect God's tenderness, meant to bring healing to the world. Mary at the wedding at Cana embodies all four: she receives, acts, and stands firm in love.

The seminar's final message was about "Building a Village." Femininity must be active—not about hustling or doing more, but about creating community, fostering friendships, and drawing people closer to God. In a world obsessed with technology and productivity, we risk losing sight of our true purpose: to know, love, and serve God. We must prioritize relationships over busyness and offer even the mundane parts of life to God.

God loves us as we are. We don't need to prove ourselves. The world is starving for real connection. Ask: Where am I needed? Host a potluck, a book club, a porch chat. Be present. Love deeply.

As St. Benedict said, "Listen and attend with the ear of your heart."

National March for Life: Ottawa May 8th

The walk itself was the most rewarding experience - filled with joyful singing, heartfelt prayers, and the laughter of young people cheering for LIFE. There were thousands and thousands of youths, and the atmosphere was one of hope and unity.

I truly believe this is an experience every Catholic should live at least once in their lifetime. It is something precious—something that fills you with hope for the future and stays with you forever.

I also had the pleasure of meeting a couple of women from other CWL councils, who were sponsored by their parishes. What a great idea for us to consider for next year! Their council covered the cost for two parishioners to attend.

After the March, there were many inspiring short talks in support of life - from conception to natural death - accompanied by more singing and laughter. On the way back, after a peaceful dinner stop in Kingston, our bus was switched once again.

I honestly thought this might be my last time on this journey (after all, none of us are getting any younger), but hearing people joyfully say, "See you next year!" - both young and old - filled me with new hope. Everyone was so happy and truly blessed to have been part of this experience.

Mass for the Unborn: London, May 14th

On May 14, several of our CWL members attended a Mass for the Unborn, celebrated at St. Peter's Cathedral by Bishop R. Peter Fabbro. During his homily, Bishop Fabbro emphasized the importance of our commitment to defending and publicly witnessing to the sanctity of life - from conception to natural death.

He expressed his deep appreciation for the strong support shown by members of the Catholic Women's League and the Knights of Columbus, calling them beacons of hope in a society increasingly influenced by a culture of death.

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Bishop Fabbro noted, "Canada is the only country in the Western world without any laws protecting the life of a baby up until the day before birth. A mother can decide, for any reason, to have an abortion the day before delivery without any legal restriction."

He also offered special thanks for all the activities that promote and uphold the dignity of life, saying: "God knows all your efforts - 40 Days for Life, Chain for Life, March for Life. For God, no effort goes unrewarded. Keep doing this. You are mocked, insulted, out in the cold and rain, but for God, nothing goes unnoticed. Lives are being saved!"

We thank Bishop Fabbro for his continued presence and unwavering support of all the initiatives in our community that honor and protect the sacredness of life at every stage.

4LifeLondon GALA: London, May 15th

The GALA is a fundraising effort by the 4LifeLondon Association to educate people on issues regarding the Sacredness of Life. This time, the guest speaker Jonathon Van Marren focused his attention on the rapidly declining appreciation for life at the end of the road. He mentioned the strongest criticisms Canada is receiving - even from institutions that are not particularly Pro-Life, like the United Nations. They believe that Canada is following a path that puts all its citizens in grave danger. He ended by encouraging everyone to participate according to their means and stage of life, at any level, to learn more and to actively cherish and protect life from conception to natural death.

Our council filled nearly three tables - hopefully next year we can bring even more people to learn about and support LIFE from conception to natural death!

Walk for Life: London, June 7th

This Walk departed from and returned to St. Mary's School. At the start of the Walk, Fr. O'Connor and Fr. Momney encouraged everyone to walk with joy and confidence, reminding us that this was a public proclamation of the value of every human life. This is not something we invented, but something we recognize as what God has taught us all along.

Referring to Acts 28, where Paul is under house arrest in Rome awaiting trial before Caesar, they shared: "St. Paul, brought there by the Jews who wanted him dead, called them together to proclaim Jesus to them.



The Jews may have thought: Are you nuts, Paul? But Paul is in love with Jesus. Paul cannot hold back - he can't stop talking about Jesus. During this walk, many will think the same of us: Are you nuts? And we can say, yes - we are in love with God and care for the TRUTH. So, we entrust the fruitfulness of this walk into the hands and grace of God."

Over 200 people - many young families, young adults, and some elderly - made it through this 5K walk, filled with prayers, songs, and cheers for the preciousness and sanctity of life. Many CWL sisters enjoyed the fellowship together. Many others came out to support the
