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Matt's Musings - The Election

There hasn't been much to muse about lately that doesn't involve politics. Among other things, Canada has a Federal election in roughly three weeks.

We're constantly reminded that it is our civic duty to vote. Fair enough, but as Catholics and, especially as Knights, is there any more to it than showing up and marking your ballot?



To answer my musings, I began my research with the Catechism of the Catholic Church. Paragraph 2240 sets out that it is morally obligatory for Catholics to exercise the right to vote.

Okay, so I have a civic duty to vote and the Church teaches us that I have to vote. Is there more than that? Can I just vote however I feel? The same way my neighbour or co-worker is?

As I continued reading, it turns out that there is more to it than that. Paragraph 2242 sets out that Catholics must obey God rather than men.

Ok, but how do I decide which candidate to vote for? Everyone in the staff room says X is the candidate to vote for. Should I just do what everyone else is doing? So, I kept researching.



Father Stephen Torraco in an article for EWTN very firmly addresses many issues that Catholic voters face at the ballot box. First, he says that Catholics must vote their conscience, but it has to be a properly formed conscience in harmony with natural moral law correctly informed and normed by the teaching of the Church's Magisterium. This is NOT the same as our opinions and feelings unless

those opinions and feelings are properly formed.

Father Torraco then gets more specific and states that it is NOT morally permissible to vote for a candidate who holds a position contrary to natural moral law and he gives as an example a candidate who is pro-abortion. Father Torraco makes it clear that regardless of your feelings or opinions or the fact that you feel this candidate might be the superior candidate on other issues, your correctly informed conscience tells you it is NOT morally permissible to vote for this



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candidate. Father Torraco says this is non-negotiable; otherwise we would be an accomplice in the moral evil at issue.

Father Torraco dismisses those candidates who say they are personally opposed to abortion but have to vote for it for whatever reason (party policy, expedience etc.) saying that they are either fooling themselves or trying to fool us. He says that carrying out an evil action such as voting for **abortion is an immoral act.** Campaign Life Coalition has a searchable website that sets out the candidates in each riding that they deem supportable based on the responses received to a questionnaire they send out.

Of course, while abortion may be the single most important issue of our lifetimes, other issues for Catholics and Knights need to come into play. St. Maria Goretti Parish in Arlington, Texas put together a "Catholic Voter's Guide". I found it helpful. In it, they list Five Non-Negotiable Issues, with Abortion being number 1, followed by Euthanasia, Embryonic Stem Cell Research, Human Cloning and Homosexual "Marriage".

It turns out the Catholic voter can't just do what everyone else is doing and will need to spend much time researching the issues, Church teaching and correctly forming their conscience before voting. It is not possible to simply show up and vote.

Lastly, **Bishop William McGratton**, the President of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops, as quoted in the Catholic Register, **states that the key to discernment is praying to the Holy Spirit for guidance and he suggests saying the Lord's Prayer before you vote.**
