Advent Blessings, Sisters in the League.

During this Advent season of new beginnings, longings and waiting for the Lord, we are invited to take a fresh approach to prayer; to ponder the Word of God, but most

importantly to become a reflection of the Light of Christ. What qualities of Jesus are we seeking in our own lives this Advent, qualities that will mirror his purpose being fulfilled through living our CWL values? This call is waking us up to move beyond our perhaps limited understanding of who we are and how we serve as Catholic women in the League.

When I think of our primary values as women in the CWL, I am drawn to faith, service and social justice. For me, this automatically suggests outreach to others. Jesus often liked to turn our human grasp of life upside down, so I propose we do the same. Let us look at faith, service and social justice as a means to care for ourselves first.

There are various ways of naming faith — dependence, trust, reliance, creed, loyalty, dogma, doctrine, confidence, tenet, persuasion, credence, fidelity and religion. Take any one of these words and apply them to yourself; they are all valid and are part of your life. With the daily effort to increase our faith, and through the gracious response of the Holy Spirit, we are able to reflect the Light of Christ. We can light our own path, if only for one step, plus illuminate at least one step for someone else. Put ourselves first.

Service is a primary Catholic Christian calling and denotes mostly attention to others whom I may learn of only through various pleas for assistance. To serve can mean assist, attend, benefit, wait on and make oneself available for others. How about service to ourselves? How do we make ourselves our priority, with discipline and structure in our lives that take care of our needs for safety, shelter, nourishment, social contacts, exercise, laughter, fine arts and stillness? When there is balance and rhythm in our own lives then we can reach out in service to others.

How do we apply social justice to ourselves? Advent wakes us up to the dangers of falling prey to the disillusionments of life, as we become overly accustomed to the shadowy existence of society. Only with a conversion of heart and the grace of God can we truly be the reflection of Christ.

May the new beginnings in each of our lives be a source of encouragement, true joy, a pathway for our journey and give us thankful hearts.

LifeStraws for Ukraine

In September, the members of St. Michael's CWL were invited to support an endeavour being undertaken by the London Ukrainian Centre. The Centre was hoping to purchase and donate 5,000 LifeStraws to the people in Ukraine who are challenged by water insecurity due to the ongoing war there.

LifeStraws are personal water filtration units the size of large straws and typically cost between \$10 and \$20 each. With them, a person is able to drink directly from any water source - ponds, rivers, even puddles - and the filtration portion of the straw filters out 99.999% of particulates including bacteria, parasites and microplastics that could make them sick.

Our members responded to the call and were very generous with their donations. In the end, we collected almost \$700 and on Tuesday, November 8th, we delivered 56 LifeStraws to the London Ukrainian Centre. The representatives who met with us were thrilled with our donation and were pleased to inform us that they would be shipped out on November 10th as part of a larger care package.

Once again, the ladies of St. Michael's CWL demonstrated their willingness to reach out to their neighbours in need - even if those neighbours are halfway across the world.
