Having been born and raised in the Catholic faith, I sometimes take for granted all that I believe without questioning. Prayers I learned are taking on more meaning now that I wonder where they came from and what they mean. The Patroness of The Catholic Women's League of Canada is Our Lady of Good Counsel. This is a Catholic title for the Virgin Mary which recognizes her as the source of heavenly wisdom and guidance for humanity. This devotion encourages us to seek Mary's intercession for discernment and help in making good decisions. We especially need discernment in these challenging times as we view her as a spiritual guide and intercessor for her Son, Jesus Christ.

The title was added to the Litany of Loreto by Pope Leo XIII in 1903. Mary's heavenly wisdom comes from her connection to the Holy Spirit and how she used it to guide Jesus as he was growing up. We recognize her role as a mother who cares for her spiritual children, interceding on our behalf to help us discern God's will so that we may attain true good. Devotion to Our Lady of Good Counsel is a way of asking her for her help in making wise decisions, finding strength in times of weakness, and following the path of truth and faithfulness.

Every CWL member has a role, and you are important wherever you contribute. There are four main types of membership. The fully active members attend meetings, share in the business portions and exercise voting privileges. Some

serve on committees and elected positions. There is a group for whom it is not feasible to participate this much. We rely on you to help on a task-by-task basis. The members who pay dues but cannot be actively involved choose to support the efforts of the League and stay informed of events and opportunities and perhaps attend on occasion. Spiritual prayer partners are vital to all of us as they keep us all connected to God when we sometimes slip in our daily practice of prayer. Our Lady of Good Counsel, pray for us.

We hosted a flower arranging workshop and made arrangements to take to some to our home bound members. We hosted the World Day of Prayer, and the featured country was Palestine, a timely choice, as that was when we heard about the war in Palestine and Israel. #### From Our Spiritual Advisor

I write to you this October as your newly appointed Spiritual Advisor. October brings us many blessings as we watch the leaves turn colour

(and fall on our lawns), marking a change in season as we stand in awe and wonder at the beauty of God's creation. Thanksgiving gives us an opportunity to gather with family and friends in gratitude for all that God has given to us, while never forgetting those who go without in our city and beyond.

Over the years I have come to know the work of the Catholic Women's League, inspiring and empowering women in our parishes to live out their baptismal call. The three core values: Faith, Service, and Social Justice lay the foundation for the good works the League does year in and year out in our parish, city, province, and country. For this we are most grateful.

For those of you who I have not had an opportunity to meet, a little on who I am! I came into the Catholic faith as an adult in 1996 at St. Peter's Cathedral. Always active in my faith life growing up in the United Church in my hometown of Port Perry, when I was received into the Catholic Church I immediately got involved in parish life with my first love - Music Ministry. Over time I served as Lector, Social Justice, Confirmation Preparation, RCIA Sponsor, CWL, and Youth Group. As I got more involved, the desire to go deeper into the faith led me to complete a Certificate in Pastoral Ministry. With some formal education in ministry, I began parttime work which led to full-time ministry at King's University College. During my seven years at King's, I enrolled in the Master of Divinity Program at St. Peter's Seminary, graduating in

2008. Also, during this time, I got involved in the Certificate of Pastoral Ministry Program first as a facilitator, then as Coordinator of the Program, which continues to this day.

In 2008 I began full-time ministry as Pastoral Minister at St. Peter's Cathedral. Fast forward to 2023, when we became a Family of Parishes, and my ministry as Pastoral Minister with the Family began. Currently my two key responsibilities are R.C.I.A.- adults and children, and Marriage (St. Peter's). I also serve as a member of our Pastoral Team, liaise with various ministries and committees, and work closely in a mentorship role with our two other lay pastoral staff members.

I am delighted to serve as the Spiritual Advisor to both the St. Michael's and St. Peter's Catholic Women's League in our Family of Parishes. Over the past three years I have witnessed the spirit and dedication of the CWL members living out Faith, Service, and Social Justice in concrete and meaningful ways. I look forward to getting to know the women of the St. Michael's Council as you continue to embrace your faith and grow in your call to service to our community.

#### Featured Member Gerarda Smith-Hillier

What do you get when you combine sea breezes, salt water, star-strewn night skies and a strong, Catholic Newfoundland family? You get Gerarda Smith-Hillier! To know Gerarda is to know a talented, humorous (even a little "salty" at times) faith-filled dynamo.

At age five, Gerarda's family moved to Ontario. They eventually settled in London which is still home for her parents and two siblings.

Gerarda attended Catholic Central. At age 17, while working part time at Woolco at the Accommodation Desk, she encountered a dashing fellow working in Sporting Goods. Lorne was 19. They began dating...and never stopped! As Gerarda says, "We grew up together." Lorne became a Catholic out of respect for Gerarda's faith and she is blessed to see the strong Catholic man he is today.

Gerarda became a teacher, attending Western and Althouse. Her first teaching job was in North York which is also where the first of their three children, Matthew, was born. They returned to London where Brendan and Olivia were born. It was important to Gerarda that she live close to her parents so her children would have an experience of extended family. Though Ontario offered many advantages to her family, Gerarda and her siblings did not have the gift of being close to grandparents who remained in Newfoundland.

She had an exemplary career in education. Gerarda taught in the classroom for twenty years and loved the Catholic school system that allowed her to be open in sharing her faith and was always conscious of her role as an evangelizer. Her three children all attended St. Mary's where she herself taught for ten years. St. Mary's was her favourite school as she enjoyed the atmosphere full of music, drama and art. Following her in-class teaching, she worked for the Board as a Curriculum Support Teacher for another four years. Then it was back into the school as a principal for seven years before retiring.

During her teaching career, Gerarda continued her education. This included a Master's in Curriculum, as well as five additional theology courses with a focus on bioethics, social justice and women's role in the Church. A strong Pro-life supporter, she volunteered, educated and led discussion at the elementary and college level. She has published faith-building short stories for children's magazines and even hosted a multifaith t.v. show where she interviewed Catholics on various themes. And with all that, balanced a thriving household when Lorne returned to school to become a teacher!

Post-retirement led to more learning.
Gerarda attained a Certificate in Pastoral
Ministry from St. Peter's Seminary which led to
leadership in our parish. She has been Parish
Council chair and has led Bible Study for the
past seven years. She is a facilitator in our parish
YANA group, a strong presence in our CWL and
an avid member of our nearly famous SMUGlees
ukulele group.

It turns out you can take the child out of Newfoundland, but you can't take the Newfoundland out of the child. In retirement Gerarda and Lorne built a cozy home on the south-west coast of "the rock", near Stephenville where her relatives still live. We're always happy to have her back in London after their three-month hiatus in a place that nurtures her soul.

We had the pleasure of hearing Marian Strom, the Foundation Chair of the Board of Directors of PHSS Medical and Complex Care in Community, speak to the members of our CWL

meeting on October 6th. Marian is also the President of the St. Peter's CWL, London North Central Catholic Family of Parishes.

PHSS provides supports to people who have complex medical, physical and/or developmental needs. These may have occurred at birth or as a result of acquired injuries later on.

There are several houses in London and a few in other communities in Ontario that have been purchased and renovated to be fully accessible. The people who live in these homes make choices about activities they want to enjoy each day and through PHSS these are realized. Families do not apply directly to PHSS and there is a significant wait list for supports and services. It is my understanding that a family could speak to their Case Coordinator in how to apply for PHSS.

Marian mentioned that PHSS provides an accessible van, at an approximate cost of \$75,000 per van to each home that requires one, to allow the people they support to attend doctors' appointments and activities in the community. Some funds are made available for dream vacations. Marian gave an example of one woman who chose a trip to the East Coast and PHSS assisted in the costs associated with that trip. There is also an apartment complex on Clarke Road for seniors and students where some people who receive support through PHSS live as well. This allows for greater opportunities for supported people to make friendships and engage in meaningful activities with the other residents in this complex.

Of vital importance to families is the 24/7 staff support of a Personal Support Worker (PSW) provided by PHSS to stay with their child/adult while they are admitted to hospital. This worker would be familiar with the ill person's needs and communication abilities and be able to provide comfort as well as assist in communicating with the hospital staff.

Marian outlined that there are three major fundraisers each year for PHSS Foundation. In April of this year at the London Hunt and Country Club, Clark Bryan, the founder of the Aeolian Hall, was honoured for his commitment to music, art, and culture in our community. In June, a Bowl-A-Thon was held at Fleetway and in August a golf tournament was held at River Valley Golf Club in St. Mary's.

I personally know many families whose adult children benefit from PHSS. As Marian stated, these supports allow people to enjoy enriching lives in their own neighbourhoods and communities. I thank Marian for her dedication to her community, including her 14 year involvement with PHSS, and for informing us about the valuable role that PHSS provides to communities in Ontario.

The energy throughout the evening was vibrant, and the process ran smoothly.
