## From Our Spiritual Advisor Fr. Felix Odobi Advent: Embracing Unwavering Hope

Advent is a time of preparation and waiting. It is a time we prepare ourselves to worthily celebrate the anniversary of the Lord's coming into the world as the incarnate God of love. "This season is marked by devout and joyful

expectation as we recall the first humble coming of the Lord at Bethlehem. At the same time, we are invited to direct our mind and heart towards Christ's final coming in glory at the end of time" (The Daily Missal).

One of the key themes of Advent is Hope. We are reminded during the Advent season of God's promises of comfort, deliverance, and restoration. Such a message instills in us hope and confidence. In this edition of our newsletter, I come to you with a message of hope—unwavering hope. This hope helps us to look above our weaknesses, limitations, incapabilities circumstances, shattered plans and set our gaze on the joy and peace that we will experience at the birth of Jesus at Christmas. Hope is the "theological virtue by which we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength, but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit" (CCC, 1817).

We journey through this year's Advent season amidst wars, rumors of wars and growing cases of hate crimes. ## Fall Regional Day

Several of our St. Michael's members were pleased to take part in this year's Fall Regional Day on Saturday, October 21st, hosted by St. Joseph Parish, Stratford. The program focused on the three CWL Pillars of Faith, Service and Social Justice and our members were inspired by the day's proceedings and excited to share their experiences at our November meeting:

Margaret Riehl was inspired by the question "What are my gifts and passions?" in relation to the three pillars. Are you outgoing or a quiet participant; a Leader or happy to be a helper; or someone who works in the community or for a cause? Possibilities for enriching our Faith as a CWL member include reading, sharing, discussing, participating in a Rosary circle before meetings, scripture studies, prayer groups and organizing or participating in retreats. Under Service, activities could include cooking, baking, crafts, decorating, visiting the home-bound, programs for the needy, and participating in the community through clothing, food collections and visiting. Suggestions under Social Justice include educating ourselves re current issues like MAID and homelessness, letter writing to MPs, inviting speakers and developing CWL resolutions.

Joan Lobsinger reported that Lori Alexander, our diocesan Service Committee chairperson, provided members with a handout which reiterated that we as members of the Catholic Women's League of Canada provide service to those in need, our parish, our local community, the country, and the world. In our league prayer we pray "teach us to share with others at home and abroad." The League is known and valued for this service. The handout also informed us of ways the Chairperson of Service could engage members. Lori shared with us that her focus will be on homelessness and so Joan invited her to be with us at our St. Vincent de Paul presentation.

# St. Vincent de Paul Affordable Housing Initiative Cathie Gauthier

We all know the good work St. Vincent de Paul does in their compassionate, generous outreach to the poor. At our November CWL meeting we found out about a new and bold initiative from honorary co-chairs, Shelley Baker and Mary Michniewicz, of the St. Vincent de Paul Building Hope for Housing Campaign.

Shelley and Mary are life-long friends who have worked together on many projects, including local and international Habitat for Humanity initiatives and they were excited to tell us about an affordable housing project spear-headed by the SVDP. Not only have they had lots of hands-on experience, but Ms. Baker also formed a charitable organization in 2002 with her now deceased husband (2020): The Richard and Shelley Baker Family Foundation. The Building Hope for Housing Foundation is in capable hands.

This SVDP housing initiative is new to London, and is chaired by Larry McKenzie, one of our own parishioners at St. Michael's. We learned that the SVDP is a major builder of affordable housing in the USA as well as some building in Canada.

A parcel of land has been purchased from St. Andrew's Parish to build a six story, seventy-two-unit affordable housing apartment. It was necessary to identify a population these apartments will be available to, and the committee has chosen single older women, new Canadians and, in general, the working poor. There will be a combination of one-and two-bedroom apartments. About three quarters will be one-bedroom apartments and all will be rented below market value. They will be rented to tenants who qualify according to affordable housing income levels.

Lots of work has already been done with many volunteering and donating their expertise including architects and builders. All permits are in process. They hope to break ground in the spring which first requires permits to be approved and the land purchase completed. This requires substantial funds to be raised by then. They are appealing to all of us to consider a generous one-time donation or perhaps a monthly donation to bring this plan to fruition. They hope to raise \$5,000,000 over the next five years.

The national CWL has chosen a deliberate focus on Social Justice in the last year. Social justice goes beyond charity to the less fortunate and looks at root causes. Homelessness and housing is an issue of concern to our council and a record number of members and guests turned out to learn about the Building Hope for Housing Campaign.

One of the hallmarks of the Catholic Women's League is how powerful we are as a group. Our Membership drive at the end of October is a very good example of that teamwork.

During all the

Masses on October 28 & 29, CWL members wore blue sashes as they took part in the various Ministries, serving as sacristans, greeters, gift bearers, lectors, Eucharistic ministers, choir members, and even just sitting in the pews. This made the CWL very visible, and many parishioners commented later on how nice it was to see so many members present and participating. After each Mass, everyone was invited into the Parish Hall for coffee and cookies. Some members were stationed at each door to hand out bookmarks to women who might be considering joining. There were several members in the hall talking to people and answering questions about the League while others were managing the coffee and cookies or taking membership dues.

Of course, the increase in membership was more than just a one weekend event, and although we are a growing parish, it took a concerted effort by many people to make this happen. It was the result of a year-long effort to promote the Catholic Women's League. This was done by having members invite guests to our meetings and social functions, promoting membership by word of mouth and social media, and by ensuring that our current members are informed through our regular emails and newsletters. We also made payment of membership dues more convenient by offering three ways to pay: in person at the membership drive, by dropping payment in the offertory basket during Mass, or by paying through e-transfer. We even had four of our members sponsor

another woman so that she could join. How heartwarming!



The membership payments continued to trickle in throughout the month of November. We currently have 24 new members, 4 new members who transferred from other Councils, and 3 members who are returning after an absence. I know of 2 other women who are planning on joining soon. As you can see, it was a busy year for us, but our efforts have paid off with a very large increase in membership!
