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***Why Catholicism and Why St. Peter's?***

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During a recent conversation with a parishioner, I was asked if I was new to St. Peter's. I had to admit, yes, I was new to St. Peter's and, relatively new to the Catholic faith as well. This led to the obvious question, why Catholicism, and why St. Peter's?

I was brought up in Toronto. My Mother was a devout Anglican, so of course I was a 'cradle Anglican'. Mom served on the Chancel Guild, an organization that, on Saturday mornings, prepared the church for the Sunday services. I was in the church assisting. I learned to replace candles, place flowers, change linens, align hymn books, decanter wine, count hosts, change light bulbs, and a myriad of other duties, too many to mention.

On Sundays, I was the extra person on staff. If an altar boy didn't show up, I filled in. Same with a choir member, usher, or anywhere else help was required. Looking back now I can fully understand why I have a certain comfort level in a church surrounding.

I married a staunch Catholic girl who came through the Toronto catholic school system, including Loretta Abbey and St. Mikes College at U of T. We married in a joint Anglican/Catholic ceremony in a Catholic church. And, yes, I took the oath with Fr. Madden, at U of T, to raise our future children in the catholic faith.

At the time I was working for 3M in Toronto. This resulted in a move to London. We settled in Byron, raised two kids, and from day one, attended the Catholic Church in Byron. Through all this I remained an Anglican in a Catholic environment. Even though I could not participate in Holy Communion, I felt religiously fulfilled.

Things changed in 2013. A new priest, Fr. John Jasica, and a new catechist Mary Catherine Bishop arrived in Byron. Fr. John was a teacher, not a preacher, and for the first time I felt the time was right to make the switch. Looking back now he also set the standard for a priest that I could look up to and sustain my awareness of my new



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religion. And full marks here to Mary Catherine (MC), who never tired of my many questions as I updated my old Anglican traditions.

Fast forward to 2019 and my life changed forever. My wife died of cancer, and later in that year a new scourge, Covid. Through these two years my religion was there to make the road forward a little easier. A great bereavement course from Sharon Hunt literally saved my soul. That was my cue to give back and even through the pandemic, we were able to comfort and assist others who had lost loved ones.

The latest twist in my life came with the new Family of Parishes program. With priests moving all over, it signaled a time to search out a new location to continue my faith. Luckily, I found a Tuesday noon service at St. Michael's here in London. This led to another new family which included St. Peter's. As weekend masses reopened, the Saturday evening at St. Peter's became my service of choice.

I've been part of, many churches in my day. But the environment I experienced at St. Peter's is difficult to explain. When seeking a new church, you look for a warm reception, a welcoming environment and a Mass conducted by a knowledgeable and relatable priest and a homily that is teaching not preaching. In St. Peter's, I found a church that met, and exceeded, every element that I thought I had lost.

In summary, a huge shout out to all at St. Peter's who provide a perfect environment for a relatively new parishioner and a relatively new Catholic.
